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Safety Data Sheet for Textiles

Usage: Textiles are used in the clothing and home textile industries to produce various types of clothing, bedding, curtains and other textile products.

Materials: Textiles are typically made of cotton, polyester, wool, silk, nylon, acrylic, and other natural or synthetic fibers.

Risks:

Flammability: Some textiles may be highly flammable and pose a fire hazard.

Security measures:
